It happened earlier than ever this year. It surprised me. With the cool, almost cold, spring weather and the way winter seemed to hang on I never gave it a thought.

I was on the edge of a massive, clear bowl, well above tree line. Sunlight glistened off six inches of amazingly dry powder that was deposited the night before over what had been a bowl of corn. Maybe it was the combination of this January-like powder over yesterday's corn, or perhaps I had finally applied the correct wax but the short traverse I made to find the line I wished to ski felt unlike anything I had skied before. It was smooth, like floating in air weightless

As I paused briefly before dropping in, I thought about how deep-blue the sky appeared. That thought passed quickly when I realized there was not a track anywhere to be seen and no other skiers in sight. "Solo first tracks on perfect snow," I said aloud, almost in disbelief.

I dropped in and felt none of the first-run-of-the-day-inthe-steeps-hesitancy to which I am too often accustom. My skis floated, perfectly. A little toe pressure was all that was needed to turn perfect

sweeping arcs down the side of the bowl. Gravity did not seem to have any effect.

That's when I heard, or at least thought I heard, a control low rumble. And then another. It was sounded like thun-

der, but when I looked up the sky was still that perfect deep-blue. A loud clap and flash of light, however, convinced me.

For what was probably no longer than a millisecond, I experienced that almost perfect feeling of a slight rush of adrenaline combined with

pure serenity. And that is when I realized it happened. Thunder awoke me from my perfect ski line to the reality of an early summer's night thunderstorm. It was The Dream.

Never before has The Dream arrived this early. Usually it

waits until after Labor Day. I used to think the turning of autumn leaves or the first frost of the year prompts it.

The Dream was always my reminder to scrape off the wax I applied diligently to the bot-

tom of my skis at the end of the previous season, resharpen the edges and apply a fresh coat of wax. Then I polish the wax to a perfect shine, the only time during the season that I do so. It is a completely unnecessary ritual, but it primes me for the upcoming season. But what now? It is only the start of summer and The Dream has already appeared. My wife is still wondering why I spend so much time with my skis immediately after the season, so I don't think I can start the rewaxing ritual already.

A non-skiing-related injury to my back prevents me from actively participating in my favorite summer sport, water skiing. I enjoy it so much because my body is built for winter; it longs for cold air. Summer heat and I do not get along and water skiing was a method of staying cool while feeding my ski addiction.

A brief experiment involving the wearing of ski boots while standing in front of an air conditioner failed to feed the ski addiction as I had hoped. It also brought some strange glances from neighbors and started some local gossip I would rather not mention. As I said, it was a brief experiment.

An additional backboard with spider straps was purchased by Norway Mountain Patrol. The patrol also received a donation for an AED. The donation was obtained by new patroller, **Michael Wilmet.** The AED will be available for use next season.

Donald Poe reports from Gladstone Sports Park that

they were open 51 days this past season and were able to cover all shifts with their patrol. They built a new patrol room last year and it served them well with the 20 injuries they attended.

I want to congratulate Mel and Mary Ann Johnson for the fine work they have done with the Navarino Slopes Ski Patrol. The patrol raised funds to add an oxygen station, an electronic blood pressure and pulse monitor, suction device and, with the help of Dick Ehrgott (one of Navarino's senior patrollers), two new hospital beds, exam dividers and over head light fixtures. They are also planning a brat fry fundraiser in the fall to add more improvements.

Navarino Slopes opened on December 19 and closed for the season on February 29. The patrol added one new basic patroller, one auxiliary patroller and two candidates.

Ralph Hicks is planning an OEC course this fall. It will be held at Norway Mountain. Anyone interested should contact Ralph for more information.

Ski Brule Challenges Patrollers to Put Their Skiing Skills to the Test

Most of us are not fine tuning our skills and testing them in April. For many of us, April means enjoying the spring sun away from the ski resort we have called home for the past several months. For others it means enjoying the sun's rays as the last few days of the ski season are counting down.

Such was not the case at Ski Brule on April 3rd and 4th as patrollers from around the Region were invited to participate in the Ski Brule Challenge. Patrollers, in nonpatrol garb, descended on the resort and were seen tweaking their skis and readying their bodies for such events as the Patrol Relay, the Downhill Biathlon and the NASTAR Toboggan Race.

The competition, which Ski Brule plans to make an annual ritual, started as a fun challenge between patrollers at Ski Brule the year prior.

"It started spring 2003 with a challenge by our patrol director, Tom Macco, challenging owner Steve Polich to a toboggan race," said Jessica Hammer, Ski Brule comanager and member of the Ski Brule Patrol. "So in the warm sunshine of the spring, after the hill closed, the challenge began. We had so much fun that it was decided to have a Patrol Challenge at Ski Brule in the upcoming year as a 'fun event' and 'thank you' to all of the dedicated patrollers of the region. The competition was designed so patrollers would bring their family members and enjoy the weekend as a family. It's another opportunity for patrollers to get to know each other, their families and develop lasting friendships."

The Challenge is hosted solely by Ski Brule and is not a NSP-sponsored competition. It allows patrollers to take some time off from patrol duties and put their ski skills to the test. Steve Polich, resort owner and himself a patroller, added color commentary over the Ski Brule PA system for many of the patroller-specific events. It added a humorous overtone that kept everyone upbeat and entertained.

While some of the events are dedicated solely for patrollers, they are inter-mixed with events designed for the entire family. The Silly Slalom featured this year is one example. Other events included a Poker Run in which family members visited resort sites and collected cards. Prizes were awarded for highest hands.

Hammer explained the reason for including events for everyone: "To be a patroller means dedication of your personal time to others, which sometimes means less family time skiing and snowboarding. In creating events that included patrollers and non-patrollers, families and friends could all participate," she said. "This also allows the opportunity for others to see the fun that comes with patrolling - it's not just work! Others can see the fun and how personally rewarding patrolling is, we can hope to create more interest in others to become patrollers."

Ski Brule provided lunch each day as well as a Saturday night banquet that was followed by entertainment . Patrollers and their families were reportedly heard singing well into the night.

Plans are underway for the second annual Ski Brule Challenge to be held early in April 2005. According to Hammer, events will be redesigned each year in order to keep them challenging. However, some of the wellreceived events may be present again in 2005.

This year Granite Peak won the award with 30% of its eligible patrollers enrolled in the program. Ski Brule came in second with 15% of its eligible patrollers involved. Calculations for next year's award will begin again this fall.

The award is designed to recognize the efforts made by patrols to improve themselves through the senior program. As patrollers improve their OEC, skiing and toboggan handling skills while working toward the Senior designation, they also make their patrol stronger. As each patrol becomes stronger our region benefits from the increased knowledge and experience of patrollers in the program.

New Twist to an Old Story

Alpine Approaches by Jim Grundstrom, ARD Alpine Training

Special thanks to **Dick Stuffle** at Ski Brule as he mentored two new instructors this past season. Bless Dick's efforts and as a result we have two new instructors in the region.

So, what is new? Everything and nothing! Programs are new because of new members taking advantage of what is offered. Nothing may seem new if you are active in NSP and keep up with the programs. "There was no doubt that our candidates had been training this season and the results reflect that." This was a very active season for the Senior Ski and Toboggan.

Our Region was approved by Division to implement the mentoring process for Senior Ski and Toboggan handling. We were one of two regions in the division approved to do so. The results were impressive with all fifteen candidates passing Senior testing for toboggan handling. Thirteen out of fifteen passed Senior testing in ski proficiency. The evaluation took place at Granite Peak and was attended by Chris Moe, Division Senior Advisor.

This year was the start of observing how each Region in the Division handles the Senior program. The goal is to standardize the process across the Division. Improvements were made to the scorecards used this season. Each Region had a Division staff member attend its evaluation and fill out a questionnaire. From this a Division Senior Manual is being developed. Since most Regions already score ski proficiency and toboggan handling separately, we followed that convention here as well this year.

We emphasized preparation most this year. Patrol Representatives and candidates were contacted early on to solicit their help in providing training opportunities for the candidates. Following this, each mentor was contacted to see who was training and how it was going for each candidate. Candidates were encouraged to utilize all the mentors they needed within both the NSP and PSIA.

This is a big commitment for the mentors and they need to dig in to help their friend succeed. A candidate without a strong ski background may take more than a year before they are ready to take the evaluation. While taking the evaluation and not being successful can be a learning experience, it generally is not looked on as such by the candidate. The far better method is to train with their mentor(s) until they have the skills and experience to be successful. There was no doubt that our candidates had been training this season and the results reflect that.

Overall our Senior Program was very active this past winter. Thanks to all who participated or assisted with it. I wish to extend a special thanks to **Tom Gilbreath**, ARD, for his assistance this past season. He was a tremendous help with this process and the organization of the ski and toboggan evaluation.
