Ski season is now approaching and we have all been busy completing our refreshers. Thanks to all the Patrol Directors and Instructors that help plan and carry out the refreshers, not to mention the efforts of the Instructor Trainers.

As we enter a new ski season I would like to thank all the people that have led our patrols over the years, and encourage some of the younger, newer people to step up into leadership roles. Our organization is aging, and many of the same people continue to fill these leadership roles. We need new people to become instructors, or instructor trainers. If you are strong in OEC or Skiing and Toboggan handling (S&T), please look into becoming an instructor. If you have been an instructor for some time, please consider advancing to Instructor Trainer (IT). These are skills our organization needs and they will also help you enhance your skills as a patroller.

I would also like to put in a plug for the Regional S&T clinic at Ski Brule on Jan. 13, 2007. This is a very good chance for new patrollers, candidates or senior candidates to learn what they need know to pass their respective evaluations. It is also an excellent chance for others to refresh these skills from some of the best PSIA instructors in our Region/Division.

Region Senior Evaluations will again be held in Section One, hosted by Indianhead Mountain Ski Patrol on 2/24-25/2007. That makes it convenient for those in our section and I encourage you to take advantage of this opportunity. However, the work starts early. Applications are due 11/25/06 to Don Close, and training starts in December. Please consider this challenge to sharpen your skills, and contact your PD, or me if you have any questions.

One last reminder is Liability Insurance Coverage.

Most of us ASS U ME we are covered, but by whom? Basically, ski area management, not NSP, covers us. NSP insurance only covers us while involved in NSP registered training and testing activities. I have asked our PD's to check into the coverage each ski area in the section has to assure it covers their volunteer ski patrollers. The basic coverage usually does, as long as we are working within the scope of our duties. That means you should be up to date on all your credentials (OEC, CPR, Chair Evacuation, Toboggan handling) and be following ski area policies and procedures. I don't want to scare anybody, but in this day and age, in our business the potential for litigation is a reality. We all must be prepared. Please talk to your PD about these issues at your ski area to make sure you are covered.

Have a great fall and I'll see you on the slopes this winter!

Congratulations to all of the award winners, and especially Section IV winners: Granite Peak Ski Patrol with the Division Large Alpine Patrol award, and Tom

There is news from Bruce Mound. Patrol Representative Scott Loveland reports that the Friends of Bruce Mound continue their work to upgrade the ski area. Blue prints for a new chalet are on the final revision and a timber sale will take place in October to sell off timber on new runs that will be cut in November. The runs will not open until the next year, but work will start this fall. # **Special Elections Update Message from the NSP National Board of Directors**

Message to Patrollers Following September 12th Board Conference

The NSP Board of Directors met on September 12, 2006 via conference call to discuss various issues regarding the upcoming board election scheduled for Fall of 2006. Well over 100 members voiced opinions concerning the election. Specifically, input from these members indicated that they felt it was important have at least two candidates for every open seat on the board. Some also voiced concern over the nominating process and the qualifications of the candidates.

"The root issue is whether the NSP board should move to fill seven vacancies, or fill four vacancies and leave three unfilled."

The root issue is whether the NSP board of directors should move to fill seven available vacancies, or fill four available vacancies and leave three unfilled. A number of division directors expressed concerns over the proposed candidate to open seat ratio and the election procedures. They suggested that only four of the open seats be filled from the slate of eleven candidates. Several other division directors expressed the desire that all seven open seats should be filled from the slate of eleven candidates. The

board also discussed the potential ambiguity with regard to certain sections of the bylaws directly affecting election procedures.

#### A few facts:

- There are three vacancies on the board as a result of early resignations by board members whose terms expire on December 31, 2007. Persons elected now to fill these seats would take office January 1, 2007 and serve for one year.
- There are four openings for current board members who terms expire on December 31, 2006. Persons elected now to fill these seats would take office January 1, 2007 and serve for three years.
- The Nomination Committee is composed of two members selected by the Division Directors, two board members selected by the board, and a fifth member selected by the four other committee members. The composition of this committee changes annually.
- The Nominating Committee selected a slate of 11 candidates to fill board seats during this election cycle.
- There are several sections in the bylaws that must be interpreted in order to resolve the issues that have been raised in these unusual circumstances.
- It's the Boards responsibility to interpret the current bylaws. The NSP Bylaws are clear with respect to the Nominating Committee being solely responsible for selecting the slate of candidates and that the NSP

Board of Directors has no right to modify, influence, or direct the Nominating Committee in performing this function. Board discussion centered on the number of directors to be selected during the coming election.

The Bylaws relevant to this discussion are:

"The Board also discussed the need for the By-laws/
Oversight
Committee to review the current by-laws and to clarify any conflicting sections"

- 3.12 Vacancies: In the event that a vacancy occurs on the board of directors, other than the position of chair of the board, such vacancies will be filled through the regularly scheduled election time line.
- 4.1 (b): The board of directors shall consist of 13 members, including the chair.
- 4.1 (b): Each director shall be elected for a three (3) year term and the terms shall be set and the elections shall be conducted so that four or five board positions per year are elected.

After substantive discussions, taking into account the

Bylaws, members concerns, potential member lawsuits and other actions, the Board voted to elect four new Board members for three year terms in this election cycle.

The Board also discussed the need for the Bylaws/Oversight Committee to review the current by-laws and to clarify/ resolve any conflicting sections. The Board Chair agreed to charge the by-laws oversight committee with this task and to have a proposed set of by-laws changes for the NSP Winter meeting. As some of the potential changes will require member approval, it is anticipated that a member vote will take place in the first quarter of 2007 prior to any actions required for the 2007 Board election cycle. By-laws/Oversight The will Committee augmented with additional members to help it perform this task.

The majority of the board felt that the election of four Board members during the current election cycle and charging By-laws/Oversight Committee with the task of proposing Bylaw revisions was the best solution for resolving the current issues. All sides of the issue were discussed openly and honestly and the concerns of all were heard. The Board anticipates that this decision allows us to move ahead in unison. Much work remains to clarify the language within the by-laws so this type of event doesn't happen again.

As we approach the Patrolling Season it is time to talk about Refresher Planning and also the Region Training to be held again at Ski Brule in January.



# Special to Powder Lines 2007 and 2008 X-C Nationals at Michigan Tech

Michigan Tech to Host Cross-Country Ski Nationals. Michigan Tech will be hosting the 2007 and 2008 U.S. Cross Country Skiing Championships.

"Pretty cool, huh? I start almost every conversation like that," said Mike Abbott, director of sports and recreation and ski buff extraordinaire. "This is a national competition. If it were basketball, we'd be calling it the Final Four."

Why is it coming here? A better question might be, why not? "Several of the skiers were here during the Junior Olympics, and they loved it," Abbott said.

"We've got great snow, and because Michigan Tech owns the trails, we've got guaranteed access. And we've got state-of-the-art grooming." Plus, we have four homologated courses, a designation that has nothing to do with milk. "Homologated" means they are certified for official competition by the U.S. Skiing Association. Tech's are among only 13 such courses in the nation, Abbott said.

Both the 2007 and 2008 competitions will be held in January and will include freestyle (skating) and classic (striding) events, as well as a separate competition for the U.S. Disabled Ski Team. Skiers who are unable to use their legs instead use their arms to speed through the course.

"We'll need quite a crew of volunteers again," Abbott said.

"And it will be a fundraiser for our own cross-country ski team and for the trails."

Thus, local skiers who won't be able to use the course during the competition may also see a major benefit down the line. "We hope to be able to install lighting on some of the trails afterward for night skiing."
