In Memoriam: Tom Landree

Tom Landree died on July 4, 2009, at Aspirus Ontonagon Hospital, attended by his family. He was 63 years old and in failing health the last few years. In spite of that, Tom was busy in his garage, working on his projects, adding to his tool base and planning the purchase of a new tractor.

Tom was the patrol director at the Porcupine Mountains ski hill for 29 years, retiring in 2004 when the State of Michigan turned over hill operation to a private managing company. Born January 10, 1946, Tom was one of the Ontonagon area "locals" who grew up with the hill and learned to ski at it. He joined the patrol at a young age and watched the maturing of National Ski Patrol during those 29 years. His Porkies call number was "2" so that tells you something. When Tom left the patrol about 5 years ago, his local call number was permanently retired, too.

Tom would hold court each Saturday and Sunday in the patrol room, regaling patrollers with his funny, witty, and well-crafted stories of adventures. Nothing was sacred stories included his "Adventures with National", the various work sites his company

sent him to, ordering his specially-made patrol supplies, his investigations on various subjects. He was quick-witted, well-read and interested in technology. He had a knack for figuring out computers in the early days, and lots of his stories were accompanied by his hilarious graphics, some of which grace the patrol room walls today. As his good friend Mary Ross (4 on the patrol, and affectionately known as Orange) says about our stories, "A lot of it we just can't print." Some of the snippets we remember: Tom passing out crayons to color "hair" on fellow (hair-challenged) patroller Bob Clark, Tom on a snowboard, riding 30 feet before he

went down, Tom having his "Mac Attack" in the lift line, Tom giving an unsuspecting patroller a prank gift or a word of encouragement, Tom's laughter heard around the patrol room, Tom & Dan "pumping themselves up" with the boot air pump, Tom at his truck

tailgate for impromptu afterclosing get-togethers...

Tom kept the patrol going many years, some of them single-handedly. His friends Les Tillman and Howell Smith Sr often visited the Porkies from Afton Alps. Howell said that Tom remarked once in spite of all the differences he had with National policies and procedures, something worked well when 4 or 5 patrollers from different ski areas could work smoothly together on a rescue and be on the same page with regard to patient care.



We have had our first freeze with some reports of snow seen in the area. So far only green grass and leaves on the ground but snow is coming. With snow comes skiing and ski racing. The school races start as soon as areas are skiable. Alpine patrollers as well as Nordic can patrol Nordic races. Contact Copper Country Nordic, Superior Nordic, Minocqua Winter Park or Nine Mile Forest for information on races which need help. Ski Jumping will also be starting. If you are near a ski jump, see if patrollers are needed for events. Practices start soon with dry land training. Minocqua has had two Nordic Walking Clinics (walking with ski poles). Check out this great way to get in shape.

Set aside the dates of January 23 and 24 for the Central Division Nordic Ski Enhancement Seminar at Minocqua Winter Park. The Telemark clinic will be Monday, January 25 at Indianhead. Please let David Squires or Betty Adams know if you are interested in basic or senior skills evaluation. We will be

The Central Division Senior Manual (page 11 and 41) guid-

ance on the SEM Advocate is as follows:

"The use of an advocate during the evaluation is encouraged. The advocate must be familiar with the region's current training and evaluation programs. The advocate is assigned to each senior candidate team for the day. The advocate accompanies the

assigned group through the entire day's activity.

This individual serves as an advocate for the team to ensure the evaluation is a positive experience.

The advocate's role is to help the senior candidates by:

 Clarifying any questions the senior candidates may have regarding the evaluation. Volume 6, Issue 3 Page 9

- On-the-hill organizing, maintaining the time schedule and ensuring the group of candidates is at the right place at the right time.
- Following the evaluation the advocate will also complete

the Senior Alpine Evaluation Candidate Feedback form (Appendix IV)."

In short the advocate will assist the candidate with the logistics of the day. The advo-

OEC Opportunities By Tom Hynes, Region OEC Administrator

#1 Myth...Once an IT always an IT.

No an IT [OEC, Transportation, Avalanche, etc.]

- A) Must be actively instructing and mentoring new instructors and candidates [patrollers].
- B) Maintain and submit their instructing activities to the region supervisor,
- C) Complete and submit quality assurance records to the region supervisor,
- D) Complete an update and if asked present updates to the instructors.

See below additional requirements.

National Policies & Procedures [2008]

6.5.9 Instructor Trainers [general] (for OEC IT job description, see section 14.7.2)

Instructor trainers are appointed based on need and reviewed by the program supervisor annually. It is a job, not an award.

- C. Responsibilities
- 1. Training and quality management

Trains, certifies, evaluates, and recommends recertification of program instructors.

Participates in Instructor Development mentoring program as needed.

Establishes mentoring instructors.

- d. Works with the division supervisor and region program administrator to implement a program of quality management to monitor the consistency and quality of instruction.
- e. Provides evaluation of individual instructors observed in teaching programs, their use of instructional techniques, and their individual skill proficiency as required for instructor recertification.
- f. Maintains instructor credential by participating in division or national instructor training seminars/clinics. (Instructor recertification teaching requirements are waived for the duration of the appointment as instructor trainer.)

6.5.11 Instructors

A. Qualifications

- 1. Is a current NSP member or associate.
- 2. Successfully completes the program's course(s).
- 3. Successfully completes the Instructor Development course.
- 4. Successfully completes the appropriate Instructor

Development mentoring program.

B. Selection

Initial appointment process

- a. Submits an instructor application to the appropriate program supervisor or administrator.
- b. Assists in teaching two or more courses under the supervision of the appointed mentor.
- c. Appointed by division program supervisor, or delegated individual for a three-year period.
- Instructor recertification (see specific details in discipline's instructor manual) Teaching requirements (vary slightly with each discipline).
 - Attends a national, division, or region instructor clinic/ seminar once every three years.

OEC & TRACTION SPLINTS

A recent question was asked in regards to when to use a traction device. This arose from information taken from the most current OEC Manual. In the manual it implies the use of a traction device be used when multiple injuries to leg are present. In further review and research at traction splint is recommended only for mid shaft femur injuries and not when additional suspected fractures or joint injuries are assessed. With multiple fracture injuries the traction may not provide the necessary traction to over come the mass of muscles of the thigh and not provide proper support to any additional distal fractures or joint injuries.
